CHAIRMANS REPORT FOR AGM 2022

Intro:

Welcome everyone to this, the third virtual AGM but first hybrid one. If this proves to be a popular format then, going forward, we will continue to use it. Indeed, there is a resolution later to change the constitution to allow for this in the future.

National Update:

There is a new treasurer at the EBU, Kay Preddy, taking over from Jerry Cope and the new vice chair is Cathryn Fox. The finances are healthier than they thought they were going to be but will still require careful management.

There was the introduction of two extra county chair meetings where the agenda was driven by the counties and the YCBA was chosen together with Kent and Oxford to run the first of these. The idea behind these was to improve the flow of information up from counties to the EBU and to get an idea what was important from our point of view.

There will no surprise as to what was on the first agenda:

Face to face bridge/club support/reattraction of internet players/hybrid events/development of novice players and EBU strategy

Green pointed county events were going to be twice as much to enter online (to encourage face to face) but the EBU backed down in face of strong opposition from some counties and made them only 50% more.

I will come back to some of these later in my county report.

REPORT:

Last year, I talked about getting players involved online and this year it is the opposite in that we are encouraging players to get back to face to face. This weekends congress is a case in point. This weekend is a case in point. Whilst I am quietly delighted with the numbers we will have playing at the magnificent new York Bridge club, compared to the 'good old days' at the Cairn in Harrogate it is quite miserly. However, this is only the second large event we

have organised and the numbers are getting better. If these are to prove really popular once again in the future, we need to encourage players of all abilities to return to face to face both at club and county level. This will take time and not be easy (and no-one knows what is around the corner).

As a county we offered restart grants to clubs to try and help them get going once again with face to face and the treasurer will update you on how many clubs took up the offer and how much we outlaid. I was encouraged at my club on Tuesday where there were 9 tables (nearly twice as many as normal) for what was an ordinary duplicate and hope this trend continues. The holiday period will of course have an impact but as clubs we need to contact those that have not returned to find out why and what we can do to assist their return.

This leads me neatly to the YL. As you know we returned to face to face for the 21/22 season and Mike Jackson, the chair of the YL committee will give a report on this later, together with an update of the online leagues we run as well. This coming season we will be trying a new approach, starting a bit earlier and having a mid season break to try and avoid the travelling in bad weather. Don't worry though there will be an online league in the middle! Many thanks to Mike/Robin Jepson and Stephen Cordingly for their organisational skills in getting these competitions up and running. Also thanks to all those players that took part.

FINANCES:

Our financial position remains strong but again not running some EBU events face to face (GNSP/Spring Congress) means another reduction in income. The freezing of county charge was also a help to clubs but this will also come to an end soon. The treasurer will also give an update on the state of the membership of the county.

RESULTS:

As for the results it is difficult to keep up with any great results achieved by our members but a few results stand out.
